# Voices from the Past

Thanksgiving in Illinois had a false start in 1838. It ended up being "a 'stag party' at the new American Hotel in Springfield" [1], described as being "a rousing ...celebration that would...'knock the spots' off anything the Battle of New Orleans or Washington's Birthday had ever shown Sangamon County in the line of good cheer" [2]. Understandably, it was 2-3 years before the first true Thanksgiving in Illinois was decreed in 1842.

The Presbyterian State Synod, at their 1842 meeting in Bloomington, requested that Gov. Carlin decree a Thanksgiving holiday. As a result, it was held on the last Thursday in December. "Very quietly...the state...slipped into an observance of the holiday..."[3] On Dec. 5, 1854 Sarah Davis reminisced in a letter to her son, George Perrin, a pupil at Mr. Hyde's School for Boys in Lee, MA:

"Your Uncle Daniel wrote that you were to spend Thanksgiving at his house [in Stockbridge MA] - I always think of your Grandparents on each Thanksgiving festival – and the days of my childhood... – My Father in the prime of life, tall erect and dignified sat opposite your Grandmother (who was always in my eyes, the prettiest and pleasantest woman in the world) and then nearest her sat my Grandmother Walker with Sunday cap and gown...and your great Grandfather sat on the other side of the table always dignified, with a pleasant word and smile for all - ... ranged around in their proper places eight children- each trying to behave with propriety, ... - Each was helped in turn - and did ample justice to the good things provided – The older ones conversed and the young ones listened ... -Illinois is so new a State, and a day of Thanksgiving is so new to us that we cannot expect our children to entertain the same feelings that the children of New England parents do -"

... Your affectionate Mother, Sarah W. Davis

Proceeds from this David Davis Mansion Foundation event provide private support for the David Davis Mansion State Historic Site, its educational programming, and its preservation initiatives.








## In the History Books (Continued)

- A Saturday Stroll in Sarah's Garden went so well in 2022 that we decided to do it again in 2023! On June 17 Master Gardeners and mansion volunteers dressed in Gilded Age costumes walked through Sarah's Garden and answered questions for visitors, who were welcome to take in the early morning sunshine and the garden's beauty while enjoying a cup of lemonade. A wonderful surprise was a visit from a plein air painter, who fascinated guests with her artwork.
- On Saturday, August 26 we had 25 kids at the David Davis Mansion for the **Children's Gardening Program!** They had a ton of fun taking a tour of the mansion and Sarah's Garden, making a flower and a tussie mussie, learning about seeds and how plants grow, dissecting a flower, and more! Junior Girl Scouts in attendance earned their Flowers, Gardening, and Playing the Past badges, and every Girl Scout took home a Gardening Fun Patch. All of the kids who participated had some great projects from the event to show off to their families!
- We love welcoming local schools to the David Davis Mansion, and we were excited to see a few field trips this fall! One specific group who visited on Friday, October 6 included approximately 80 first grade students from **Tri-Valley Elementary School**. As part of their visit they toured the house and Sarah's Garden and did a special activity with Master Gardeners. One of their teachers, Ms. Connor, had this to share about their experience: "We all had a blast and the kiddos can't stop talking about how awesome and beautiful the house was. They learned so much and we hope to come back to visit again!" We also had visits from about 50 area homeschoolers and 30 museum studies students from Illinois Weslevan University. We're looking forward to seeing even more students in the spring!
- On Wednesday, October 25th the David Davis Mansion hosted author Edward Achorn with Special Guest Dr. Marcia Young in the mansion barn for a discussion on his book entitled The Lincoln Miracle. Ed was a highly informative and entertaining speaker and the audience was large, with over 50 people in attendance. Dr. Young also gave an excellent talk on the David Davis Mansion as a Gilded Age home, which was enjoyed by all. The Lincoln Miracle, as well as Edward Achorn's first book, Every Drop of Blood, and Dr. Young's book The David Davis Mansion, 1872-2022: 150 Years at Clover Lawn were available for sale in the Clover Lawn Museum Shop after the event, and both authors graciously offered to sign them in the mansion sitting room while attendees enjoyed a reception.


- 21 visitors had a great time on the **Behind the Scenes Tour** on Saturday, October 28. A couple of those who attended went on to attend Mystery at the Mansion or purchase tickets for Christmas at the Mansions!
- We are happy to report that this year's 1920's Murder Mystery Night, **Mystery at the Mansion**, was even more successful than the 2022 event! On Saturday, November 4th we welcomed over 120 people into the mansion for an evening of live ragtime and jazz on our antique piano, great food and drink, beautiful flapper-style party decor, and a fun, clue-inspired mystery game. The feedback from attendees was overwhelmingly positive and everyone had a wonderful time. We hope to offer this program again in 2024, so stay tuned for more information!
- November 11, was extremely popular this year. It brought in a much larger crowd than the first year we held this fundraiser in 2021! Several people showed up early and waited in the cold, (followed by hundreds more later on) to enter the barn and shop our extensive selection of holiday decorations, some of which were donated by mansion supporters, and others which were retired from the mansion's own Christmas collection. ## Voices from the Past

Three years, 4 months, and 5 days after the death of his beloved wife, Sarah, Judge Davis married his 2<sup>nd</sup> wife, Adeline "Addie" Ellery Burr. Forty-year-old Addie had long been a traveling companion of her paternal aunt Adeline Burr Ellery Green. During their visits to Washington, D.C., they became quite well acquainted with the Judge and his wife, Sarah. Sarah even gave Addie her calling card with an invitation to visit her in her rooms written on the back.

The Judge & Addie were married on March 14, 1883. By the end of June, Addie was entering the Bloomington social scene.

A new addition to the online collection tells us with whom the Davises socialized during their marriage. It is Addie Davis' "List of Companies Attended & given ---- Since Coming to Bloomington - June 1883". It is a plain, pocketsized, ruled notebook in which she kept a record of all of the invitations she received, from whom, and if she attended, along with, in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half, all of the invitations that she extended, who she invited, and what, if any, special reason

there was for the invitation. One interesting

notation was this one:

14" Nov 1885 - Lunch to 150 ladies all who have called on me since I have lived in Bloomington

One has to wonder if by this time it had become apparent that the Judge's health was failing and she sensed that her time in Bloomington was limited. After this lunch, until the time of the Judge's death on June 26, 1886, Addie issued invitations for only 6 more "companies" and increasingly refused invitations she received.

An index identifying people mentioned has been added. They are best guesses because many of them are the adult children of the Judge and Sarah's friends with similar names. Being only 8 months younger than the Judge's son, George, the invitations are often a mixture of both the Judge's friends and their children's friends.

#### About these photos:



The top left image features Addie in her wedding dress. It was taken at Ormsby Studio in Oakland, CA on the Judge and Addie's wedding trip. On the reverse side of the original photo, which resides in the Adeline Burr Davis Green Collection at Duke University, it says "In my wedding dress 15th May 1883", presumably in Addie's handwriting. It also says, "Addie Burr Davis" in a different handwriting. Both are written in pencil. In ink, it also says "Golden Brown Silk". Our DDMF Researcher checked the letters from the wedding trip, and the Judge and Addie were indeed in Oakland, according to their traveling companion, the brother-in-law of Sarah Davis, Daniel Rogers Williams. He had made a similar trip to the west nearly 20 years before via Steamship through the Panama Canal, up to California, in the spring of 1865. The letters from both of these trips are on the Illinois website listed above.

The other two photos are also from the Adeline Burr Davis Green Collection. The first, to the right was taken of Addie when she was approximately 42. The last photo, at left, is of a young Addie on the left and her friend Bessie Moriarity on the right. This was taken during her time in school in Cambridge, Massachusetts, c. 1860 through most of the Civil War. She was likely in her late teens.


## It's About Our People
